The Epiphany of our Lord 6 January 2019

In December I wrote about a Beerwah cafe who had responded to my article in the Glasshouse Country News by offering a free Christmas Community Dinner to thank those in the local community who give a lot and often don't get time to receive as well as those who were doing life a bit tough at Christmas time. THE EPIPHANY OF OUR LORD

Epiphany means 'showing forth' and marks the occasion when the Magi arrived at Bethlehem and the baby Jesus was 'shown forth' to Gentiles for the first time. The story is a reminder that from the beginning of his life, Jesus was for all people, not just the Jews. It is first mentioned as a Christian festival in 200AD in a letter from Clement of Alexandria and therefore is older than Christmas (which has only been commemorated on 25th December since the end of the fourth century). The Eastern Church (the Orthodox churches) celebrate Epiphany as 'Christmas' or the 'Feast of the Incarnation'. By the fourth century, Epiphany became one of the three great festivals alongside Easter and Pentecost. It was the day most commonly chosen for baptisms. Epiphany was adopted as a major festival for the Western Church in Gaul and has been kept as a festival separate from Christmas since the late fourth century.

The whole legend of the 'wise men' arises from the account recorded in Matthew's gospel alone and arose during the Middle Ages. At this time, the Magi became three in number, who were promoted as kings - drawing on psalm 72 - and acquiring the names of 'Caspar, Melchoir and Balthazar.' The three gifts are understood to symbolize Christ's life - gold for kingship, frankincense for priesthood and myrrh for death. Epiphany is the Twelfth Night after Christmas and is the formal end to the Christmas festival.

OFFERING OF GIFTS

The offering of Gold

Lord our God,
as gold in the furnace is tried
and purified seven times in the fire,
so purify our hearts and minds
that we may be a royal priesthood
acceptable in the service of your kingdom.

Blessed be God forever!

The offering of Incense

Lord our God,
as our prayer rises up
in your presence as incense,
so may we be presented before you
with penitent hearts and uplifted hands
to offer ourselves to you in priestly service.

Blessed be God forever!

The offering of Myrrh

Lord our God,
as you give medicine to heal our sickness
and the leaves of the tree of life
for the healing of the nations,
so anoint us with your healing power
that we may be the first-fruits of your new creation.

Blessed be God forever!

Everlasting God,
who brought the nations to your light
and kings to the brightness of your rising:
fill the world with your glory,
and show yourself to all the nations;
through him who is the true light
and the bright morning star,
Jesus Christ your Son, our Lord,
who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
one God, now and for ever. Amen.

FIRST READING

Isaiah 60.1-6

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you. For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the Lord will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you. Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn. Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms. Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you. A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come. They shall bring gold and frankincense, and shall proclaim the praise of the Lord.

Hear the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

Commentary: This is a visionary setting from the prophet. Writing against a backdrop of uncertainty, disillusionment and low morale, and perhaps while the Jews are still in exile in Babylon (about 530BC?), the prophet looks to a visionary hope that one day God would inaugurate a new Jerusalem, which shall be so attractive that people from all nations shall

come to your light. The reading has captured the Christian imagination, and is read today because of its reference to the wealth of nations being brought to Jerusalem, and gifts of gold and frankincense to proclaim the praise of the Lord.

PSALM 72:1-7,10-14

Response: **The Lord brings justice to the people.**

1. Give the king your judgement O God:
and your righteousness to the son of the king,
2. That he may judge your people rightly:
and the poor of the land with equity.
3. Let the mountains be laden with peace
because of his righteousness:
and the hills also with prosperity for his people.....**Response**
4. May he give justice to the poor among the people:
and rescue the children of the needy
and crush the oppressor.
5. May he live while the sun endures:
and while the moon gives light,
throughout all generations.
6. May he come down like rain upon the new-mown fields:
And as showers that water the earth.
7. In his time shall righteousness flourish:
and abundance of peace till the moon shall be no more.....**Response**
10. The kings of Tarshish and of the isles
shall bring tribute:
The kings of Sheba and Seba shall offer gifts

SECOND READING

Ephesians 3.1-12

A reading from Paul's letter to the Ephesians

I, Paul, am a prisoner for Christ Jesus for the sake of you Gentiles – for surely you have already heard of the commission of God's grace that was given me for you, and how the mystery was

made known to me by revelation, as I wrote above in a few words, a reading of which will enable you to perceive my understanding of the mystery of Christ. In former generations this mystery was by the Spirit: that is, the Gentiles have become fellow-heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel. Of this gospel I have become a servant according to the gift of God's grace that was given me by the working of his power. Although I am the very least of all the saints, this grace was given to me to bring to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ, and to make everyone see what is the plan of the mystery hidden for ages in God who created all things; so that through the church the wisdom of God in its rich variety might now be made known to the rulers and authorities in the heavenly places. This was in accordance with the eternal purpose that he has carried out in Christ Jesus our Lord, in whom we have access to God in boldness and confidence through faith in him.

Hear the word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

*Commentary: The wise men are the first non-Jews - that is Gentiles - to recognise Jesus as the human expression of God. In this reading from Ephesians, Paul emphasises that Gentiles too **have become fellow heirs, members of the same body, and sharers in the promise in Christ Jesus.** He sees his own role as that of bringing to the Gentiles the news of the boundless riches of Christ.*

GOSPEL

Matthew 2.1-12

Alleluia! Alleluia!

We have seen his star in the East;
and have come to adore the Lord.

Alleluia!

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew, chapter 2,
beginning at the 1st verse.

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, 'Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage.' When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, 'In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: "And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel."' Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, 'Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have

found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage.’ When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure-chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

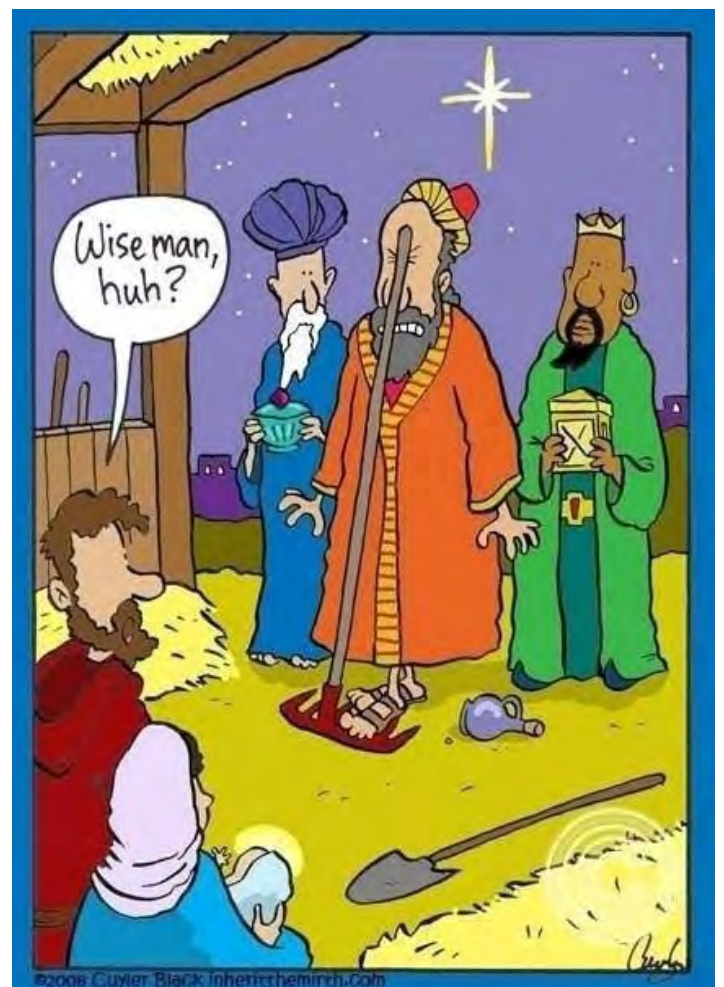
This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Commentary: Only Matthew records the story of the visit of the wise men. Tradition has settled on three of them, only because there are three gifts; and given them names and identities - Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar. It could be that Matthew in recording this story is making a number of points. The gifts for example, could represent kingship (gold); priesthood (frankincense) and prophecy (myrrh). These three categories - prophet, priest and king - represent the three categories of leadership in ancient Israel. Matthew in his story might be saying that in Jesus all those who fell into one of these three categories in Israel's past history recognise that in Christ all these roles come together, in a way which is primary, and by which their roles are fulfilled.

Sentence

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you *Isaiah 60:1*

We are preparing a copy of the **Annual Report Book** with reports from the Rector, Church Wardens, Treasurer, and all ministry groups. Our Synod Representatives (Kay and John Turner) continue in their role for this year.

Nomination forms for all positions are available at the back of each church. You are reminded that these are nominations and elections may be required. It is therefore possible that you will not be elected, however everyone is encouraged to show their interest and nominate. If you are interested in finding out more about the role, please speak to a member of Parish Council. While it is possible to fill positions from the floor of the meeting, it is desirable for people to have considered the role carefully and prayerfully before nomination.

*Following Diocesan regulations governing Parish Annual Meetings, questions, petitions and motions to be raised at the Meeting need to be given to the Rector in writing a week in advance, by **Sunday, 17 February, 2019.***

We are aware of some people who are not yet on our **Parish Roll**. Unfortunately, if you are not on the roll, you will not be able to vote at the annual meeting. We want everyone to feel they belong and can have a say. There are some copies of the form to join the roll at each Church - please take one and return it to the Sidespersons as soon as possible.
