A MESSAGE FROM OUR RECTOR JULIE

Over the past couple of months, I have really enjoyed leading the congregations at Mary MacKillop and St Andrew's through the Leading Your Church into Growth program in preparation for developing a Mission Action Plan for the future of our Parish.

It can seem an incredibly daunting task to imagine what the Parish of the future will look like. Can you imagine how the Aura development will change our local area? What about the new Beerwah East development? It seems impossible to me to think that the State and Federal Governments are expecting over 100,000 people to move into our Parish boundaries within the next 10 years. Where on earth do we start?

But the great news of our planning process has been that God has already been preparing us, and the local community, for that growth. One of the big questions that was asked in the first three sessions of the process was 'Where do we see God at work?' The feedback sheets list over 50 different ministries, community activities and situations where we are already aware that God is at work—

from Busy Bees to roadworks bringing our Parish closer! And what's more, we have over 300 ideas of what we could do to improve our communication (both within the parish and beyond); develop our children's ministry; encourage pastoral care; offer more regular opportunities for prayer; and provide events for people to invite others to meet members of the congregation. The list goes on.

We have three more sessions to be held in late October at St Andrew's and then three sessions in November at Mary MacKillop and we will also have some more informal discussions sessions to provide extra time for us to consider some of the ideas being presented. I encourage you to be part of these sessions and have your say about where you feel we can enhance and develop the ministries we offer as we plan for the future.

Most importantly, I ask you to continue praying and reflecting on how God is at work in our lives and has been over the life of the Parish. With God's guidance I see a great future for us... but we need to be willing to listen to God and then follow wherever he leads us.

ST ANDREW'S CARE

St. Andrew's Care is a Federal and State Government funded agency offering home maintenance and minor modification in clients' homes.

Who is eligible for assistance?

To be eligible for assistance you must be a home owner and live in the home as your main residence or live in rental housing and be in the target group of:

- Frail aged 65 years and over or
- Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander, 50 years and over, or
- A person under 65 years with a disability or a carer of any of these target groups.

CURRENT SUBSIDISED SERVICES (which carry a \$100 labour subsidy)

Air Conditioners:	Service and minor repairs to split system models and ducted.
Annual Spring Clean:	Inside cleaning that you have difficulty doing, e.g. skirting boards.
Anti-Slip Treatment:	Treatment on tiles to prevent slips and falls.
Appliance Repairs:	Washing machines, stoves, refrigerators, clothes dryers and dish washers.
Carpet Cleaning:	Carpet cleaning carried out in your home.
Cleaning Other:	Ovens, ceiling and exhaust fans and light shades.
Electrician:	Changing light bulbs and smoke alarm batteries, repairing faulty power points and lights, and any other minor electrical repairs.
Gas Fitter:	Repairs, service and installation of gas stoves and hot water systems.
General Maintenance:	Repair loose door and cupboard hinges, broken steps, brackets etc.
Glass Repairs:	Replace broken windows or glass doors.
Locksmith:	Replacing broken or lost keys, replacing damaged locks.
Minor Tiling:	Minor repairs or replacing broken or cracked tiles.
Pest Control:	Cockroaches, silverfish, ants etc. Termite inspections & treatment.
Plumber:	Leaking taps, toilet repairs, replacing broken taps, fitting water filters to taps and any other minor plumbing jobs.
Pressure Cleaning:	Driveways, patios and paths to prevent a slip/fall.
Roof & Gutters:	Minor repairs to tiled and metal roofs and guttering plus replacement of small sections of guttering. Gutter cleans on homes.
Security Screens:	Replacing rollers, screens and other minor repairs.
Shower Doors:	Repair or replacement of faulty shower screen doors.
Window Cleaning:	Service includes cleaning inside and out, tracks and flyscreens.

If you are interested in becoming a client of St. Andrew's Care and you are 65 years of age or older, you must first register with My Aged Care on 1800 200 422. You will need your Medicare Card with you when you make the phone call. When the face-to-face interview happens, please inform the assessor that you would like St. Andrew's Care to do your home maintenance. They will forward your assessment to our agency and we will make contact with you and from then on, you will be a client and able to take advantage of our services.

RE-IMAGINE FAITH FORMATION FOR THE 21st CENTURY

I attended the Lay Conference on Saturday 4th August at St Paul's School, Bald Hills, presented by John Roberto. The presentation began promptly at 9am and finished at 4pm with short breaks for morning and afternoon tea and a longer lunch break. During the four sessions, we were absolutely bombarded with information and ideas for intergenerational faith formation and church growth.



When Rev Timothy suggested I should write a report on the day, I looked over my notes and the handout from the conference with dismay. How could I possibly present the remarkable content of the conference in a short report? Then I noticed certain key points that I had written in capital letters, underlined vigorously and punctuated with exclamation points.

START WITH WHAT YOU HAVE

In our parish we have lots of grandparents with grandchildren, so have a service/event that brings them to church together. Music: concerts both for the congregation and also with grandchildren/ Busy Bees children taking part. Parents come to see their children perform!!

Plan events to celebrate the main seasons of the church- Lent, Easter, Pentecost, Advent, Christmas. The church can plan 4-5 major functions around those themes and advertise and invite the community to join in. Also use the weather seasons for functions and encourage families to attend (for instance a Summer Picnic).

TRY LOTS OF THINGS

Some events will be more successful than others. Messy Church, Blessing School Equipment at the beginning of the year, and Blessing of the Pets in October were three of the special worship opportunities suggested. High on Mr Roberto's suggestion list however, was the use of our internet resources, the church website and Facebook page, not just for service times but, for example, Sunday sermons (also linking to podcast!).

Starting a monthly cycle on our website of prayer and Bible readings following a theme was also an

idea, for example "Gratefulness". John suggested listing links to activities for children and families as well the daily prayers and scripture. The monthly studies could either begin or culminate with a church service with the theme of "Gratefulness", followed by a meal together. We can link our Busy Bees Facebook page to our church website so our Busy Bee families receive general information about the Parish as

well as the information relating specifically to them.

GOOD FOOD AND COFFEE

Many times and in many different church situations John emphasised the importance of coming together as a community over a meal. I think we "do food" fairly well in our Parish, but the importance of sharing a meal together was paramount in his suggestions for faith activities.

DON'T GIVE UP!!

This is just a tiny portion of the ideas that were talked about on the day. However, I think my last highlighted point is very important. We do have to try new things to grow both the faith of our Parish and the number of people attending services and events. Some new ideas may not work but that does not mean we should just put Faith Formation in the too hard basket. Perhaps the most important suggestion that John Roberto spoke about is that we pray, as a Parish and as individuals that our faith, worship and activities will attract others to come and see.

EUNICE REMEMBERS

I received this article, 'Nostalgia' from a friend and can relate to what has been written, plus more, and I have listed some to share with others who might also remember the early 40s to mid 50s.

I remember the milkman delivering milk from a tank, originally on the back of a horse drawn cart until he went 'UP MARKET' and transferred the tank onto the back of a new truck. We would take our milk jug out to the truck and he would fill it for us.

The baker delivered bread (all unsliced and unwrapped) in a horse drawn cart and it was all tossed into the covered cart hessian bags. The bread could still be warm when delivered, and I remember one time when my mum sent me out to get half a loaf, the aroma was too tempting, and I sat on our front steps and gradually plucked out the middle of said loaf. I wasn't tempted ever again!!!

We only had an ice-chest to keep food cool (no frozen foods back then) so if you wanted ice-cream for dessert, it could be purchased as a block which was then sliced as required. I had the job of going to our local store, purchasing the ice-cream and then running back home as fast as my legs would go, before the block melted – a challenge.



My Dad had

a horse and cart which he used for transport to and from work each day (five miles away). Traffic back then was not as dense as it is today.

As children, we could roam freely to play and often played 'cowboys and Indians' in the neighbouring bushland with other local children. Our yards were big enough to play "backyard cricket," "rounders," "donkey," "hide and seek" and "what's the time Mr Wolf." No TVs to keep us amused – we had to amuse ourselves and use our imaginations.

Were they really the "good old days?" Perhaps!!! We do know they were vastly different to today, and I am sure that none of us would want to return to using the old wood burning stove and wash copper, where my mother stood for hours boiling/washing/rinsing the clothes each wash day.

I'll happily stick with my automatic washing machine... 'tis joy!!!

The Coaldrake Award was presented to the **Rev Joan Pascoe** on Wednesday 27 June at St Andrew's by the Rev Ken Spreadborough, Chair of the ABM (Anglican Board of Mission) Brisbane Diocesan Committee.

This award recognises the contribution of former missionaries and dedicated staff members who, by promoting the Gospel and growing the Church, have laid the foundation for the missional partnerships that continue to underpin all the work of ABM today. It is named after the Rev'd Canon Frank Coaldrake who served with distinction, first as a missionary and later as Chairman of the Board.

ABM gave the award in recognition of Joan's work as a missionary in the Dogura area in Papua New Guinea. During the service and the lunch following, she had the opportunity to speak about some of her experiences from that time.
